<b>Design and Technology</b>	<p>By raising questions about the effect of technological change on human life and the world around them.</p> <p>By enjoying and celebrating personal creativity, especially in their final DT session of each unit.</p> <p>By reviewing and evaluating existing products, for example exploring and evaluating a range of existing products and evaluating their ideas.</p> <p>By instilling a sense of awe, wonder and mystery when studying the natural world or human achievement.</p> <p>By encouraging creativity that allows pupils to express innermost thoughts and feelings and to reflect and learn from reflection, for example, asking 'why?', 'how?' and 'where?'.</p>	<p>By raising questions about the effect of technological change on human life and the world around them.</p> <p>By presenting pupils with moral decisions through designing, selecting materials/ingredients, methods of manufacture, considering the needs of others, as well as cost, the sustainability and environmental impact.</p> <p>By encouraging pupils to consider the wider community and show respect to others and take responsibility for their own actions and of those around them, taking into consideration the consequences.</p> <p>By educating pupils to become responsible consumers.</p>	<p>By ensuring pupils show mutual respect when working individually and collaboratively.</p> <p>By asking pupils to articulate their thoughts and feelings about their own and others' work, and learning to give and take criticism without offence.</p> <p>By exploring the equality of opportunity and provides an awareness of areas that have gender issues e.g. encouraging girls to use equipment that has been traditionally male dominated.</p>	<p>By considering cultural influences on design.</p> <p>By considering functionally appealing products when we design.</p> <p>By asking questions about functionality vs. aesthetics. This is also prevalent as we explore local and seasonal food and consider food waste.</p> <p>By teaching pupils that all their design work should be sensitive to needs and beliefs of different backgrounds, ensuring all imagery, text and products won't cause offence.</p>
